veterans residing in Northern California Veterans' Homes and Hospitals. To make this a memorable day for our veteran's power-



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RBOC report, Call to Action:

RBOC has been urging recreational boaters to contact their State Senators and Assembly Members ASAP and request that their elected representatives reject Governor Newsom's proposal for a 300% increase in boat registration fees. It is not a tax increase for voters to approve, but instead authorizes future registration fee increases by the Governor without legislation. The cumulative impact is that 750,000 boaters throughout California will be made to pay more and get less for boater programs and services. Fortunately, this increased boater registration fee, that proposes to raise some \$22.5 million dollars was not passed in the Governor's recently approved 2023/2024 California Budget but may still be added as a "rider" to the budget.

We should still voice our concern that this 300% increase, that will not return any more value to boaters, ignores the substantial \$107 million per year contribution boaters already pay via the state fuel tax. The combination of much higher fuel cost with higher boat registration fees could very well cause in a ripple, damping effect throughout the economy,


resulting in the loss of boater business at marinas, nearby restaurants, and stores.

News from Per and Erika on Allure's Adventures in Sweden

First Swedish winter on the hard...

Here in Sweden, there is the "boating season" and the "boat season". The boating season is the pleasant part, the one we enjoy all year around in California, but in Sweden it is a bit more restricted in time. The boat season, is when you focus on maintaining and repairing the boat. And dreaming of the boating season.



Generally the lakes and part of the Baltic Sea freezes, so boats are stored on the hard through the winter. Typically, boat clubs and marinas have space where the boats are placed next to each other and the owners, with varying degrees of ambition, build sheds or covers to protect against snow and wind.

Allure was about to experience her first boat season in Sweden. Needless to say, we were quite nervous. As far as we know, Allure has since 1932 never been on the hard for more than a few months at a time. Now we are talking about October through April. How would she manage?

The cold temperatures also mean that wooden boats are taken out of the water early enough for the water content in the wood to reduce sufficiently to avoid freezing damage. The expanding ice particles "explode" the wood. Supposedly, we are told, mahogany wood, that is used in many old wooden boats in Sweden, is particularly sensitive to this kind of freezing damage. How would yellow ceder do?

We are now members of a non-profit club, run by the members, with the intent of proving mooring during the summer and storage during the winter.

At this club we managed to get a space in a "cold hangar", so Allure would not need to stand outside. Since it is a non-profit club, members join to get things done, so on the day of getting the boats out of the water, everyone was help-



ing each other. The club has a hydraulic crawler on order, which will greatly help getting boats out of and into the water. Until it arrives things are done the old fashioned way with a sled on rails that run into the water picking up the boat and bringing it on land. Then a giant forklift moves the boats from the sled to the storage sites. The club's members have been doing this for decades and decades and are quite experienced. *Allure* was one of

the biggest boats that day and she safely ended up in the right place.



wood in the hull. The hanger was full of old wooden boats, some quite a bit older than *Allure*, so on

> many days there were other enthusiasts there working on their old wooden boats leading to pleasant conversation on techniques and methods.

> Even though we had been making great progress throughout the winter, it was a bit of a mad dash to get all pieces back together before splash day. One of the last tasks was applying a soft caulk between the planks of the hull and give her a new coat of bottom paint. We made sure that we had 4 bilge pumps in working order. With the same collaboration as in the fall, we got the boats back in the water. *Allure*'s engines started quickly. There was quite a lot of water leaking for the first few hours, but the hull pretty

To prepare for winter, we needed to make sure we drained all systems of any liquid that could freeze and also to winterised the engines, which essentially comes down to making sure all hoses are either empty and dry or filled with antifreeze. There is a certain skill to be learned in running the engines for the right short amount of time to suck the anti freeze from the bucket and not so (too) long that it all exits with the exhaust. Practise makes perfect.

Our main maintenance task this winter was getting the leaks from above under control and also to bring the brightwork up to a sustainable level. Erika proceeded to strip the outside of the helm down to bare wood and then applied 8 or 9 layers of varnish. She also redid all the caulking of the teak decks. Together we worked on all the all the helm windows, took out the glass, restored the frames, and put it all together again. Two panes of glass has to be replaced. Throughout the winter Erika applied linseed oil to all exposed quickly sealed itself and she was back to normal.

Allure survived her first winter in Sweden. We are ready for a new boating season to begin.



Classic History: Memories of Opening Day Festivities in the Past—by Mel Owen

Photo dated October 12, 1940, the day the Owen family bought the soon to be *Pat Pending*. A survey at Madden & Lewis in Sausalito that day found

Yacht Club. That is an Alameda shipyard in the background. Circa 1950. We always had a crowd on board. Notice the middle deck has no benches and no access from the bridge except out the door and climb over the low railings.

Mel tells the story of one Opening Day event back many years ago. "Did you ever hear the time, during an official CYA parade, *Teakwood*, a former member's yacht, was the lead vessel with the coast guard on board on the fly bridge, when we had a "man" overboard. We followed the standard procedure and retrieved the passenger. The Coast Guard said "Well done Captain". And of course, Hal Schell, in his magazine, said E. Ray Honeycutt (owner of *Teakwood*), tossed his mother overboard, just to show off, for the Coast Guard.

Teakwood, in an undated photo below, was a rare yacht. Only five were built during the War by the White Shipyards on the Oakland Estuary as surveillance craft. It featured a fly bridge with remote steering and a broad fantail stern.

A Rembrance of Jim Staley by Gerry Kamilos

Jim Staley, an Association member of over 30 years, has passed the over the bar. Jim was member of the



Northern California Fleet. He was an inspiration to all he met as member of the Classic Yacht Association and as a human being. He was the owner of *Tule Lady*, a 34' 1928 LaBruzzi built boat, a one of a kind, just like Jim. Jim was a regular at many Classic Yacht Association events, es-

pecially at the Classics at the Corinthian Yacht Show. He spent time in the Korean War and wrote a book about 8 years ago, "Come In, Swanee Leader," about his Korean War experience. Jim chronicled 33-month journey onboard USS LTS 561 from 1951 to 1954. His book won many awards. On a personal note, my Dad was in the Navy during the Korean War, I shared Jim's book with him, and after reading Jim's book, for the first time my Dad shared his Korean War stories with me. I certainly have that to thank Jim for.

The last time we were together was in 2021 at the Corinthian Yacht Club. I was so impressed that at 91-years, he single-handed docked *Tule Lady* in very tight quarters. Impressive at any age. Coming on board *Tule Lady* was magical in that his dedication to her truly shows; *Tule Lady* is a fine example of what the Classic Yacht Association is all about. The attention to the details is so clear and perfect. *Tule Lady* will be special to her future owner(s), a tribute to Jim and all those that had the privilege to own her. The Northern California Fleet members were so glad to be with Jim and his wife, Carol, to celebrate his 91st birthday during the 10th Annual Classic at the Corinthian show in September 2021.

Jim had a great sense of humor, after we all sung happy birthday to him, with the assistance of Mel Owen at the harmonica, he joked, "that he was so old that when the doctors tried to determine his blood type, they told him it was discontinued".

The legacy he has given the Classic Yacht Association of steady membership, active participation, dedication to the preservation of *Tule Lady*, and comradery with humor he brought to all of us, will never be forgotten.
